




NAP 5 Commitment Updates cont.



The graphic above shows the breakdown of the 36 commitments across the five themes in the 5th U.S. Open Government National Action Plan. While this categorization is the basis for the structure of NAP 5, progress is assessed at the commitment and sub-commitment level, as individual commitments are independent of one another and often have different agency leads for their respective sub-commitments. The graphic below provides an additional summary look at the completion status of the 70 sub-commitments, now broken up into NAP 5's five themes. For each possible status (Complete, In Progress, Not Started), both the count and the percentage out of 100% are provided for each of the five themes.






 Record high number of requests received in FY 2023 with 1,199,644 requests submitted. This is a 29% increase in requests received from FY 2022.




FY 2023 Annual Report Summary Highlights


FY 2023 Annual Report Summary Highlights

 Record high number of requests processed in FY 2023 with 1,122,166 requests processed. This is a 28% increase from FY 22.




FY 2023 Annual Report Summary Highlights

Reminders about Estimated Dates of Completion (EDCs)


- Reminder that the FOIA requires agencies to provide EDCs upon request.
- See <u>OIP Guidance on Assigning Tracking Numbers and Providing</u> <u>Status Information for Requests</u> for additional information.
- OIP will soon be issuing updated <u>Guidance on Adjudicating</u> <u>Administrative Appeals under the FOIA</u> to emphasize the importance of providing EDCs for appeals.



FOIA.gov Search Tool

Last October, DOJ released a new advanced Search Tool on FOIA.gov to help users identify already publicly available information and the best agency to which they could submit a FOIA request if desired. Below are some usage stats:

- Over **50,000** queries since launch
- Most users (58%) independently select the predefined user journeys
- Additional users (14%) are directed to the journeys based on their search terms
- Remaining users who enter search terms are given agency and/or document results, averaging:
 - **1.3** agency results per query
 - 3 document results per query

FOIA Business Standards

- OIP, in collaboration with the Office of Government Information Services, is working with the Office of Shared Services & Performance Improvement at the Government Services Administration and the Business Standards Council to develop shared FOIA Business Standards in line with the Federal Integrated Business Framework (FIBF).
- The FOIA Business Standards Working Group has completed drafting baseline standards, which include the Federal Business Lifecycles and Business Capabilities, and incorporating feedback from agencies.
- <u>Draft standards</u> are currently open for public comment on <u>Regulations.gov</u> through May 17, 2024.



Government Accountability Office Report on FOIA Backlogs

In March 2024, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) published a <u>report examining FOIA backlogs</u> across the federal government. The report:

- 1. Describes factors agencies identified as causes of backlog increase
- 2. Describes methods agencies reported using to address backlogs
- 3. Assesses relevant government-wide guidance and resources
- 4. Describes the perspectives of agency and non-government stakeholders

GAO analyzed CFO Reports and data on FOIA.gov, conducted focus groups with agencies and nongovernment stakeholders, and reviewed FOIA guidance and resources.



Government Accountability Office Report on FOIA Backlogs

GAO recommended that:

- OIP issue additional guidance on creating backlog reduction plans with an emphasis on key elements that should be included in backlog reduction plans such as identifying root causes, addressing staffing, and establishing goals.
- OIP more closely examine agency overall median and average request processing time data included in agencies' Annual FOIA Reports and update its training to specifically include how the agency overall metrics should be calculated.




